The international drug trial called the "CAMBRIA-2" trial is almost ready to commence enrolling new patients. This trial aims to compare the effectiveness of the new hormonal drug treatment camizestrant in reducing the risk of breast cancer from coming back with the standard care anti-hormone treatments. The CAMBRIA-2 trial is for patients with a certain type of breast cancer.

The CAMBRIA-2 trial will be one of many international clinical trials that have been coordinated via Breast Cancer Research Unit at Waikato Hospital over the past 25 years. Trials also ensure that staff keep up to date with the latest developments in treatments and help maintain a beneficial culture of enquiry and exchange of ideas with other research units doing the same trial around the world.

The participation of Waikato Hospital staff in trials and the publication of results helps attract staff to work or train at a progressive unit or hospital. It allows Waikato Hospital/Waikato District to demonstrate it has a commitment to research, which improves the health care of people in our region.

The most important reason for clinical trials is that patients benefit from taking part – they receive access to new drug treatments and the close monitoring associated with trial participation.

BCRT research nurses Hina and Jenni attended the Breast Cancer Trials annual scientific conference held in Cairns, Australia 24-26 July. A number of Waikato Hospital medical colleagues also attended. Conference speakers were leading researchers from other international research organisations such as the Austrian Breast Cancer Study Group, Kings College London, Royal Marsden Hospital London, Harvard Medical School in the USA and more.

Over the three conference days delegates were inspired by progress being made with advanced breast cancer treatment through new targeted drug therapies, improvements in cancer detection through modern imaging techniques, research to understand further the complexity of breast tumours (which leads to drug development), and novel ideas for upcoming clinical trials. Our links with other international research organisations bring clinical trials to the Waikato and New Zealand and mean improved outcomes for wāhine/women diagnosed with breast cancer.
