

Nine women are diagnosed every day with breast cancer in New Zealand, so it's likely that someone in your workplace, whānau/family, neighbourhood, or from your community has been affected. Next month is breast cancer awareness month. I encourage you to mark October with raising awareness of breast cancer symptoms, self-checking, and early detection through regular mammograms.

The Register is a vital resource for monitoring standards of care, service planning, and for research.



The "Suppression of Ovarian Function trial" ("SOFT") has recently completed 20 years of follow-up. We acknowledge the 17 Waikato women who participated. Over 3,000 women from 25 countries were enrolled in this clinical trial. Research nurses like myself form a close working relationship with women as we journey alongside them throughout trial treatment and long-term follow-up. These are the women that inspire our work and for whom we always want to improve outcomes.

## The Suppression of Ovarian Function Trial 20 years on

The SOFT is a large international clinical trial specifically for younger women with hormone receptor positive breast cancers. Very young women have had worse outcomes than older women diagnosed with breast cancer. The SOFT trial was carried out to understand if suppression of the production of oestrogen could result in a better outcome compared to the standard treatment for young women.

Results so far have shown there was an overall reduction in recurrence of breast cancer, and this information has changed practice in many parts of the world. We need to look and see whether suppression of the production of oestrogen ultimately improves survival. We now await the results from the 20-year follow-up analysis.

Waikato SOFT participants were pleased to hear of the advancements in treatment that have come about through this trial and were pleased to contribute to the now improved standard of care.

#### Keytruda to be funded from 1 October

This is good news for New Zealanders diagnosed with advanced triple negative breast cancer who will soon receive free treatment with Keytruda. From 1 October 2024 Pharmac will fund Keytruda (also known as pembrolizumab) for those with recurrent or advanced (incurable) triple negative breast cancer.

Although the best time for these women to begin Keytruda would have been earlier, last month's announcement from Health NZ brings us closer to the treatment that those diagnosed with this aggressive type of breast cancer urgently need.

#### Marg Jenkins' Legacy: A Gift of Hope

The loss of a close friend to breast cancer and seeing the enormous ripple affect her loss had on her family, friends and far-reaching community was the catalyst for my volunteering for the Breast Cancer Research Trust (BCRT) in 2017.

I wanted to contribute in some way to help people diagnosed with breast cancer. I had built a connection with the team at the BCRT through my work at the Waikato Times and when I retired, asked if there was any volunteer work I could do to help. Gathering donated prizes for gala auctions and spot prizes was one way I could contribute.

What the team at the Breast Cancer Research Trust do is progressive and inspiring. The passion to make a difference for breast cancer patients, their families and their futures is nothing short of commendable.

The BCRT team has participated in more than 50 trials covering aspects of breast cancer care from prevention to new surgical techniques, better drug treatments, better radiation therapies, better patient communication and studies to help improve patient quality of life.

Around five women are diagnosed with breast cancer in the Waikato every week. Around 3,000 women are diagnosed with breast cancer across New Zealand every year.

I won't always be able to help through volunteer work, so I made a bequest to contribute to ongoing research, which will improve the outcomes for more women who will go on to live productive lives, as well as futureproofing research for those yet to be diagnosed.
